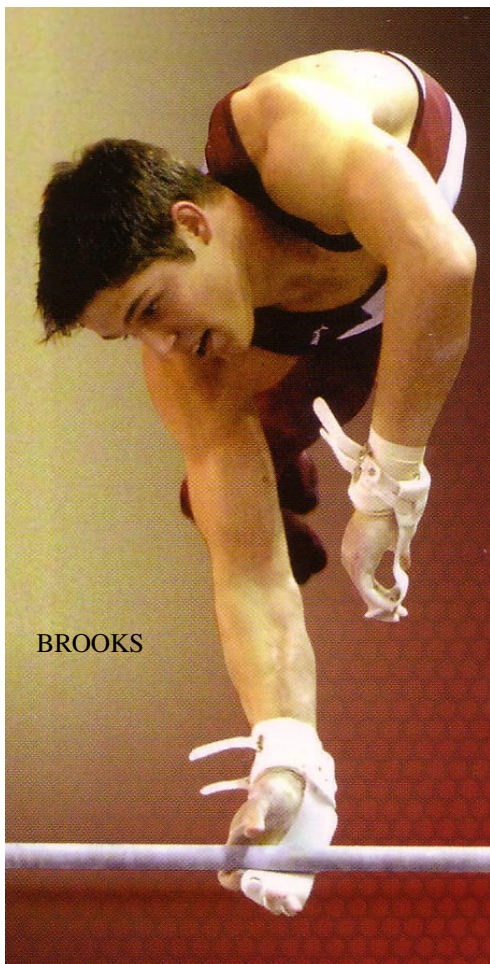


UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA

Oklahoma kept its undefeated streak alive with a win over Stanford and Minnesota at the Sports Pavilion on Saturday. The victory over the Gophers and Cardinal marks the fifth and sixth top-10 opponents the Sooners have defeated on the season.

The Sooners won the competition after scoring a 357.85 in the victory. Stanford posted a 356.40 and finished second while Minnesota placed third in the competition with a 347.95.

Sophomore Steven Legendre claimed the event title on vault with a 16.20 and senior co-captain Chris Brooks claimed the high bar title with a 15.10 and the all-around with career high score of 90.20.

“Chris did a great job tonight in winning the all-around,” said head coach Mark Williams. “Without him tonight we would not have been in the same position.”

OU claimed three team events on the night with pommel (57.15), rings (59.05), and vault (64.20). Oklahoma started the night on rings

and won the apparatus with a score of 59.05. Jacob Messina led the Sooners with a 15.00 and finished in second place on the event.

The Sooners finished second on the floor apparatus with a season high team score of 61.20. Brooks claimed the event title with a career-high 15.60. Freshman David Finning also posted a career high score of 14.55.

On pommel horse, OU finished first led by Messina after he tied for the event title after posting a 14.70. The Sooners also won the event with the help of Steven Legendre (14.20) and Corey English (14.50), as they posted a team tally of 57.150

OU scored a 58.20 to come in second on high bar with Chris Brooks tying a career high and winning the event title with a score of 15.10.

Oklahoma received a career-high 16.05 from Bobby Shortle on vault to win the event. The Sooners won the apparatus with a team score of 64.20. Legendre capped off OU's performance on the event title with the night's top vault score, a 16.20.

The Sooners finished the night placing second on parallel bars with a score of 58.05. All OU gymnasts that competed on the event scored a 14.05 or higher. Brooks led the way on the apparatus scoring a 14.90 to finish third.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY

Stanford took second in Saturday's tri-meet with Minnesota and Oklahoma, hosted by the Golden Gophers in Minneapolis. The Cardinal was bested by the Sooners by just 1.45 points, 357.850-356.400, as Stanford and Oklahoma split event titles, with the Cardinal taking floor exercise, parallel bars, and horizontal bar.

Josh Dixon once again topped all competitors on floor exercise, registering a 15.750 and tying his personal best on the season, while Eric Hergenrader earned his best mark of the season on the event with a 14.05. Sho Nakamori also turned in his personal season-best with a 15.4. On floor exercise as a whole, Stanford recorded 15.25 or better on all four scores counting towards the team total, and picked up its season-best total of 61.85.

On pommel horse, Dixon also scored his season-best of 13.95, and Hergenrader was the top Cardinal performer with a 14.4, good enough for fourth place.

Tim Gentry took home another still rings event title, picking up a 15.05 on the event; as Stanford went on to score a 57.4, and on

vault, Gentry again scored well, turning in a 16.15 for second place individually.

Nakamori brought in the Cardinal's third individual event title on parallel bars with a 15.25, helping Stanford to a season-best team total on the event of 59.00. Two other gymnasts earned personal season-highs as Dixon posted a 14.15 and Nick Noone posted a 14.8.

On horizontal bar, Dixon placed third, notching a 14.95 and Bryant Hadden tied his personal season-high on with a 14.3. Greg Ter-Zakhariants took second on the event

with a 15.05.

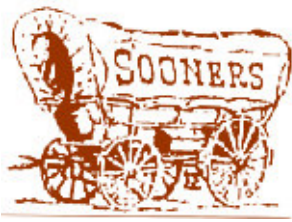
UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA

California men's gymnastics team defeated Ohio State, 352.70-337.25 on Friday night at Haas Pavilion. Kyson Bunthuwong led the Bears with a first in the all-around, with an 88.80, and won three events.

As a team, the Bears won all six events, and took all six individual event titles, as well. Kyle Bunthuwong won floor (15.20), freshman Glen Ishino took pommel horse with a 15.10, Kyle Brady won rings (14.90), Kyson Bunthuwong finished first on parallel bars (15.00) and high bar (15.00), Kyle and Kyson



tied for first on Vault with each scoring a 15.65.

It was the final home meet for Cal's four seniors - Kyson Bunthuwong, Justin Franklin, Evan Roth, and first-year law student Kyle Brady. They were honored during the pre-meet and awarded the traditional wooden Bear by head coach Barry Weiner.

Kyle Bunthuwong started the Bears' evening off with their first win - a victory on floor with a 15.20. Bryan del Castillo nailed his final tumbling pass on a great routine to score 15.00, which was good for second place. Evan Roth was fifth (14.35), and freshman Daniel Culpepper scored a 13.85 for sixth place. Kyson put forth a crowd-pleasing flair in his routine, scoring a 13.90 and freshman Ishino got on the board with a 13.75.

Ishino moved up in the all-around standings with a first-place victory on pommel horse (15.10). Kyson was third at 14.60. Nic Blair struggled ever so slightly in the midst of his routine but finished strongly to earn a 13.30 and finish sixth. del Castillo (13.25), Danie Geri (13.10) and Kyle Bunthuwong rounded out the event for the Bears, taking sixth through eighth places, respectively.

Cal took first and second on rings with Brady winning his signature event with a 14.90. Kyson and Roth tied for second (14.65). Ishino was fifth at 14.45; Eric Haeussler was ninth (13.85) and Kyle Bunthuwong was 11th (13.40).

The Bears handily swept vault, winning the event and taking the top places. Brothers Kyson and Kyle tied each other for first place, each notching a 15.65. Haeussler was third (15.50) and Roth was fourth (15.15). Geri tied with OSU's Shachar Tal for fifth with a 14.95.

Led by Kyson's first-place 15.00 outing, Cal commanded parallel bars, taking the top-five spots. Brady was second (14.80), Ishino was third (14.70) and Haeussler and freshman Jim Kerry tied for fourth, each with a 14.60.

The Bears solidified their victory on their last event of the night - winning high bar, 58.30-52.70. Kyson was first with a 15.00 to preserve his all-around win and Ishino was right behind him in second with 14.75.
