STANFORD UNIVERSITY

Stanford earned a big dual meet victory on the road Saturday night, knocking off defending national champion Michigan, 351.25-346.20. The Cardinal had the higher score in five of the six events on the way to an impressive victory.

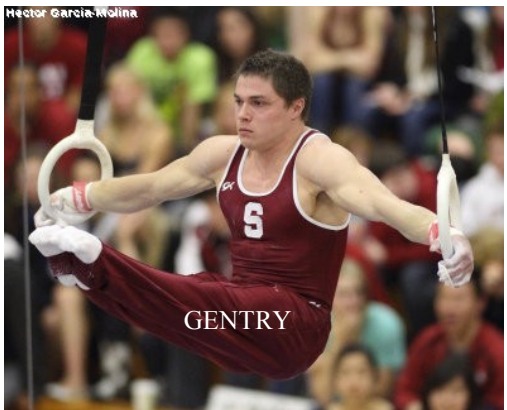
The Cardinal began the night on the pommel horse with its lowest score of the night. Stanford scored 54.80 in the only event that it did not top Michigan. Gabriel Alvarado led the Cardinal in his best event with a score of 14.50. The other top scores came from Chris Turner (13.95), Jason Stevens (13.35) and Abhinav Ramani (13.00).

Stanford then moved onto the floor exercise with a score of 59.60. After two events, the Cardinal still trailed by just over a point. Josh Dixon paced Stanford on the floor with a score of 15.70. Alex Buscaglia also scored in



the 15's with a mark of 15.00. Rounding out the scorers were Ryan Lieberman and Pal Hichwa who each scored 14.45.

The Cardinal next went to the vault and took over a lead that it would not relinquish. Dixon and Tim Gentry scored 15.95 to lead Stanford to a score of 63.35. Buscaglia (15.80) and Ramani (15.64) added the other



scoring totals to finish the rotation.

Gentry continued a strong meet by leading the Cardinal in the still rings with a score of 15.55. Overall, Stanford scored 60.50 as Jordan Nolf also scored over 15 with a score of 15.10. James Fosco (14.95) and Lieberman (14.90) completed the Stanford scoring.

Moving on to the horizontal bar, the Cardinal scored 56.90. Buscaglia did not have his best routine, but still scored 14.40 to lead Stanford in the event that he won the Pan-American title. Hichwa added a 14.30, while Gentry and Lieberman both scored 14.10 to complete the scoring.

Finishing up on the parallel bars, the Cardinal scored 56.10 in the event. Lieberman led the way with a score of 14.90 in the same event that he won an individual national title a year ago. Turner also fared well, scoring 13.80, while Dixon and Gentry had identical 13.70's.

UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA: Feb. 19.

Wyatt Aycock, Andreas Hofer, Eric Schryver, Wyatt Baier and Anthony Ingrelli all claimed event titles, but the No. 8 Nebraska men's gymnastics team dropped a 348.10-342.90 decision to No. 10 Iowa on Satur-



day in Iowa City.

Aycock claimed the individual all-around title with an 82.70, as the only all-around competitor for either team on the night. Aycock produced a 15.00 on vault (6th), a 14.60 on parallel bars (2nd), 13.90 on high bar (T6th) and still rings (T7th), a 13.00 on floor exercise (11th) and a 12.30 on pommel horse (11th).

Hofer captured his event title on high bar with a 14.40, but Nebraska's top all-arounder did not compete in the all-around because of illness. The sophomore did compete in four

events on the night despite the illness, adding a fifth-place finish in rings (14.30), while also competing on bars (12.90) on horse (12.60).

Schryver got the Huskers off to a winning start by claiming his second career event title with a win on pommel horse. The freshman posted a 15.20 on the event. David Jacobs added a tie for fifth on the apparatus with a career-high 14.00, but the Huskers managed just a 54.70 on the event.

Nebraska posted its top team score with a 61.30 on vault led by Baier's 15.70, which tied Iowa's Anton Gryshayev for first on the event. C.J. Schaaf and Will Eastman tied for third on the event with scores of 15.30.

The Huskers also slipped past the Hawkeys on high bar with a team total of 56.50, while Iowa managed a 56.00. Hofer captured the event crown with a 14.40 on bar. Schryver tied for third with a 14.20, while Jacobs added a fifth-place finish with a 14.10.

Ingrelli rounded out the Husker titles by matching Iowa's Gryshayev for a still rings win with a 15.20. Hofer added a fifth-place finish with 14.30 for the Huskers.

Eastman added a second-place finish on floor exercise with a 14.50, while Ringle contributed a third-place showing with a 14.40.

Aycock led the Huskers by tying for second with a 14.60 on parallel bars. Ringle added a fourth-place showing on the apparatus with 14.50.
