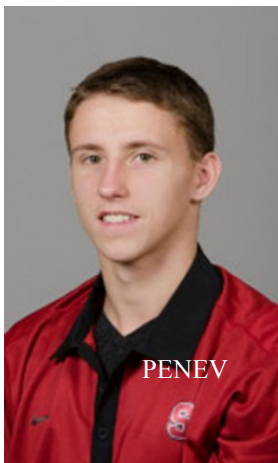

**STANFORD UNIVERSITY**

Stanford won the team competition at the Stanford Open Saturday night, defeating California, Nebraska and Washington before a sellout crowd at Burnham Pavilion. The Cardinal's season-high 348.400 was more than enough to best the Golden Bears (339.000), Cornhuskers (332.600) and Huskies (251.200).

After last week's meet against California in which Eddie Penev had what one teammate remarked was "the meet of his life", the distinction was short-lived as he shattered four career marks in tonight's victory. Penev posted a career-high in the all-around (89.200) for the second consecutive meet along with personal bests in floor exercise (16.200), still rings (14.500) and parallel bars (15.000). Penev finished first in all-around, floor, vault (15.400) and parallel bars.

Penev's teammates filled out the rest of the scorecard, highlighted by first-place showings by Paul Hichwa on high bar (14.500) and James Fosco on still rings (15.200). Gabriel Alvarado (14.500)

was tied for first on pommel horse with Cal's Glen Ishino. Freshman Brian Knott finished third in the all-around (84.900), including top-five finishes on floor, pommel horse, vault and high bar.

Strong performances by Sean Senters on floor (14.600) and vault (15.000), Hichwa, Fosco and Alvarado are positives the team can take from the meet as they have a break in the schedule.

"Chris Turner, Cameron Foreman, Cale Robinson and Knott are qualified for the Winter Cup next week," Glielmi said. "The (rest of the) team has some down time before our next meet."

**UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA**

Top-ranked University of Oklahoma suffered its first loss of the season, falling to No. 2 Illinois on Saturday, 349.800-347.700. No. 7 Michigan scored a 339.100 to take third place in the triangular meet, held in Champaign, Ill.

Oklahoma led the Fighting Illini through the first five of the six rotations before Illinois scored a 61.400 on high bar to knock off the nation's No. 1-ranked team. The tri-meet marked the Sooners (6-1, 1-0 MPSF) first regular-season loss since falling to Stanford on March 7, 2010.

"Illinois had a pretty electric atmosphere," said OU Head Coach Mark Williams. "The home team took advantage of that and came away with the victory because they wanted it more. We gave things away, little by little."

Despite taking second in the overall meet, the Sooners still took event titles on floor and parallel bars. OU junior Jake Dalton claimed three event titles - floor, rings and parallel bars - along with the all-around title with an 88.400. Through three meets, Dalton has accumulated two all-around titles and 10 event titles.

The Sooners began the night by posting a 59.200 rings to take an early lead. Dalton led

Oklahoma with a 15.300 followed by junior Chris Stehl (14.900) and freshman Michael Squires (14.600). Junior Presten Ellsworth tied a career best with a 14.400.

Oklahoma totaled a 60.200 on floor behind a 15.900 from Dalton and a 15.200 for sophomore Raymond White. Senior Michael Heredia set a career high with a 14.700.

Freshman Dylan Akers posted a career-best 13.900 on pommel horse to lead the Sooners in their 55.000 showing on the apparatus. Freshman Jacoby Rubin scored a 13.900 and White earned a 13.700.

On high bar, the Sooners scored a 57.500 with Dalton claiming the team's best score of 14.900. Freshmen Rubin (14.600) and William Clement (14.400) each scored career highs.

After four rotations, Oklahoma led Illinois by a narrow margin of 232.200-231.400. The Sooners put together a 58.100 on vault after White notched a season-best 14.900 to extend their lead to 290.300-288.400 with one rotation remaining.

Oklahoma concluded the meet with a 57.400 on parallel bars, but it wasn't enough to match the Fighting Illini's 61.400 on high bar in the sixth rotation. Illinois' high bar total, fueled by C.J. Maestas' 15.600 and Paul Ruggeri's 16.000, gave the Illini their first lead of the meet and with it, the victory.

**UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA**

California finished in second place at the Stanford Open on Saturday evening at the Cardinal's Burnham Pavilion. The home team Stanford won the meet with a 348.400 while the Bears were in second with 339 points to place ahead of Nebraska (332.600) and Washington (251.200).

Donothan Bailey was second in the all-around, accumulating an 87.400 behind Stanford's Eddie Penev, who notched an 89.200. Bailey finished second on floor (15.400) and tied for second on rings (14.800).

As a team, the Bears finished second on three events - floor, pommel horse and parallel bars.

With a 14.500, Glen Ishino tied for second on pommel horse. He also tied for fourth on floor with a 14.800. Jean Monteclaro tallied a 14.300 on floor.

Four Bears scored at or above 14.00 on pommel horse with Ishino leading the way with a 14.500. Bailey was next in line (14.200) followed by Jean Monteclaro and Nic Blair - both of whom scored 14.000.

Steven Lacombe tied for fifth on rings, scoring a 14.500. Bailey's 14.800 was tops amongst the Bears. Jean Monteclaro pitched in a 14.300.



Jean Monteclaro paced the Cal squad on vault with a 14.500. Vault also saw both Jeffrey Langenstien and Bailey receive 14.400s.

On parallel bars, Daniel Culpepper was second with his 14.500. Bailey nabbed a 14.300 and Jonathan Liu had a 13.900.

Bailey led the Bears on high bar, scoring a 14.300. Jim Kerry received a 13.700, Jacob Jizrawi a 13.400 and Joshua Van Bourg a 13.300.

**AIR FORCE ACADEMY**

Highlighted by a victory on the still rings from senior Devin Menefee and a tie for the top spot on the high bar from sophomore Mac Ritchie, the 10th-ranked Air Force men's



gymnastics team posted a season-high 337.700 during a dual meet with No. 8 Minnesota (345.400) on Saturday, Jan. 28, at the Academy's West Gym.

Menefee tallied a 15.000 - his second-highest score of the season - to easily win the event. He paced two Falcons to finishes within the top half of that event, as sophomore Ben Zaiser scored a career-best matching 14.400 to place fifth on that event.

Ritchie matched his career high of 14.400 to tie for the top-spot on the high bar. Like Menefee, he was one of two Air Force gymnasts to place within the top half of the field on that event, as junior Tory Brown scored a 14.100 to tie for fifth.

Freshmen Nick Gaudlip and Josh Ramos tied for second on the floor exercise with matching marks of 14.600, while Ritchie recorded that third-best score of the meet at 14.300. The 14.600 marks, career best for both Gaudlip and Ramos, are tied for 13th on the program's all-time list.

Brown paced the Falcons on the vault, scoring a career-best 14.300 to tie for third with Zaiser. Menefee also finished within the top six of that event, behind a score of 13.800.

Freshman Skyler Awisus tied for third on the parallel bars with a personal-best score of 14.400 - the ninth-highest score in Academy history, while Ramos and senior Jacob Houdner finished fifth (14.200) and sixth (14.100), respectively. Ramos moved into 13th on the program's all-time list with that career-best score.

Junior James Okamoto and freshman Corbin Palmer finished fifth (13.800) and sixth (13.700), respectively, on the pommel horse. Palmer's score is a personal improvement of nearly one point and the 17th-highest score in Academy history.

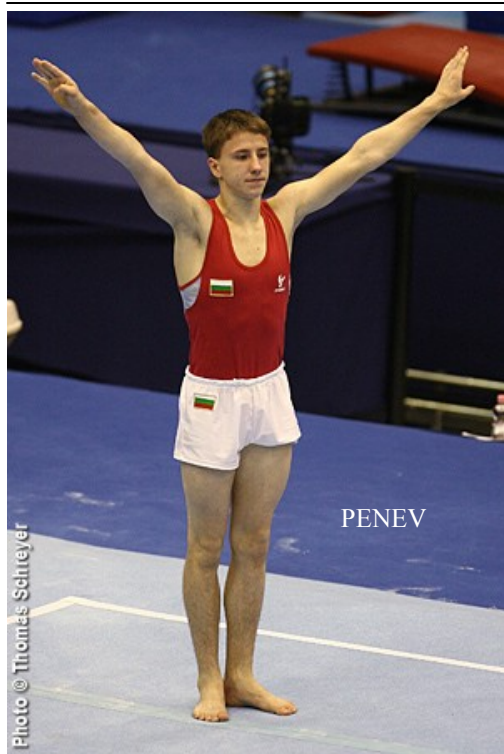
